Derek Stanford, Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature, is a widely-published English critic and essayist.

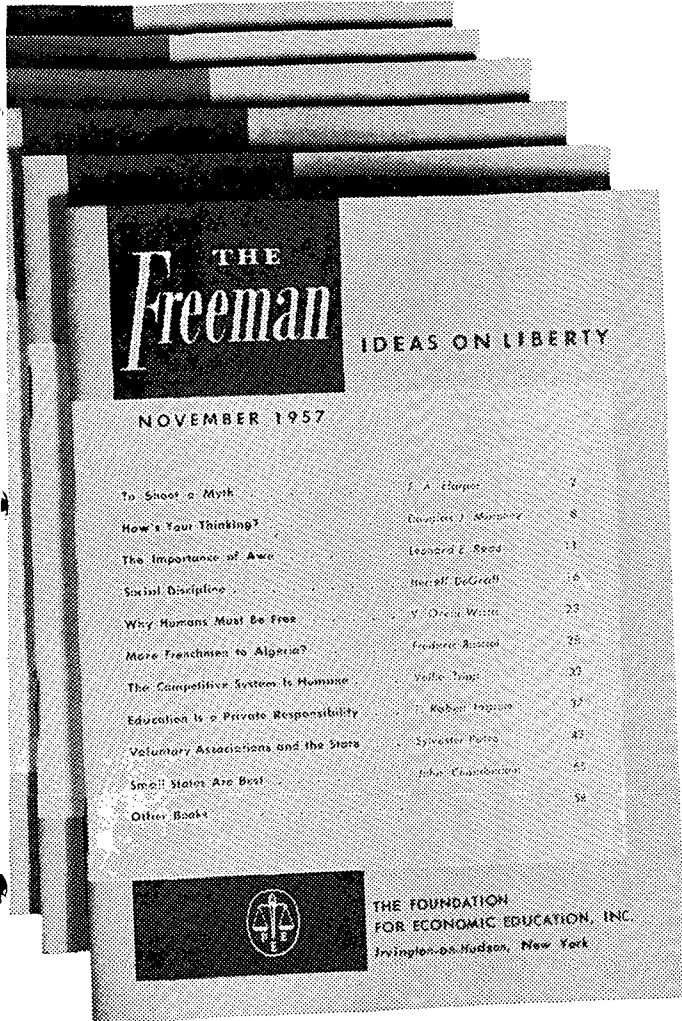
Sidney Tillim, of New York City, writes frequently on social questions in art and culture, and does reviews for *Arts* magazine.
